# **PASTOR'S CORNER**

Dear Friends.

This weekend, we celebrate the *Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time*. In today's first reading we see how lepers were treated according to the Mosaic law. They were unclean and ostracized from society. No one was to come into contact with them for fear of contracting the disease. In fact, if anyone touched a leper, he or she would be automatically declared unclean (even if they did not contract the disease). Jesus then, showed His authority over the Mosaic law and over leprosy itself by cleansing this leper. Jesus reached across the void that separated the leper from society, doing the unthinkable by touching the man. Jesus' action was a response to the man's faith, for it was the leper who first reached out to Jesus and believed that Jesus could heal him. Jesus saw his human dignity and had compassion for him. His act of touching the leper had the opposite effect of what should have occurred according to the Mosaic law. Rather than the leper making Jesus unclean, Jesus made the leper clean. All Jesus did was touch the man and say, "Be made clean," and the leprosy left him.

As we have seen in recent Gospel readings, Jesus here was revealing Himself to be God in the flesh by speaking and acting with divine authority. Yet, Jesus commanded the man to keep this miracle a secret. Why? Although Jesus was revealing Himself, He knew that it was too soon for a full disclosure of His identity. Jesus did not want a riot or people to become sensationalized by His miracles. He knew that too much talk would actually hinder His ministry initially because He wouldn't be able to effectively preach if there was too much sensation around His message. We, in fact, see this being the result of the healed man not heeding Jesus' words and telling everyone anyway. As a result, "it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly." Regardless, today we can imitate the Leper's enthusiasm about sharing what Jesus has done in our own lives. After all, Jesus brings healing to us even today and our encounters with Jesus never leave us the same.

With the coming of the season of Lent, we begin our annual Lenten campaign called "Change for Christ". It is when we distribute cups for you to take home and fill up with "spare change" reflecting your sacrifices for others in need. You can return your cups of change during the season of Lent and/or place your donations in the receptacles in the church. In recent years we have assisted the charitable works in the diocese of St. Thomas, Virgin Islands. This year, however, we will be changing our cause and sponsoring a charitable organization a little closer to home. It is Mother of Mercy House located in Kensington, Philadelphia. It was founded by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia several years ago to be a "presence" on the streets of that community. Our priests and religious are very active there in serving the needs of the poor in that community. I would invite you to visit their website <a href="https://motherofmercyhouse.org/">https://motherofmercyhouse.org/</a> to learn more about them. Kensington, Philadelphia has been in the news lately regarding many challenges they face to help those who are struggling with poverty and addiction. Our cause this year can greatly benefit them and support the charitable efforts of those priests and sisters who minister there. This is a wonderful cause and an opportunity especially to teach our children the need to make sacrifices for others and to recognize the face of Christ in those who are poor and needy.

Soon, with the First Sunday of Lent, we will be singing the Entrance and Communion Antiphons at each Mass. These Antiphons are very much an integral part of the Mass. They are the words of the Mass itself. Since the promulgation of the new Mass of Paul VI in 1969, provision has always been made however, to allow for the substitution of these texts with another "suitable hymn or song" and this is what we usually do on Sundays at our sung Masses. This in many ways can be seen as a blessing or a curse. On the one side, we have experienced a variety of musical choices for the Mass. On the others side, we have not been singing the Mass itself as the Second Vatican Council desired. With recent awareness of their scriptural richness (and new musical compositions provided for them), there has been a renewed interest to make these Antiphons more a part of the established and varied repertoire of the Church today. It is my hope that these musical settings will provide a way for you to pray the Mass itself better and to deepen your appreciation of the Word of God among the many other hymns and songs that lift our spirits at Mass. I look forward to sharing more with you about the music we have planned for Lent over the next few weeks. In the meantime, I hope and pray these changes will add to your journey towards Easter.
